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ASIAN SECURITY AND HONG KONG'S ROLE IN THE GLOBAL WAR ON TERRORISM

U.S., Hong Kong Experts, Officials to Discuss U.S.-Asian Cooperation in War on Terror

WASHINGTON, April 24, 2003 — Raymond Wong, Hong Kong's commissioner of customs and excise, Kurt Campbell, director of the CSIS International Security Program, and Ken Juster, under secretary of commerce for industry and security, will join a distinguished group of speakers to discuss Hong Kong's role in the global war on terrorism from 8:45 A.M. to 3:15 P.M. on Monday, April 28, at CSIS, 1800 K St., NW, B-1 conference level.

Policy experts and senior government officials from the United States and the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region will focus on three key issues of importance for Hong Kong and the United States: strategic trade controls; terrorist financing; and transportation security. The impact of SARS on Hong Kong and regional economic security will also be addressed throughout the day.

"As the world's busiest container port and a major transshipment center, the largest international air cargo terminal, and the eleventh largest international banking center, Hong Kong is central to regional and global initiatives to fight terrorism," said Campbell. "Working with its regional counterparts, Hong Kong has a critical role to play in protecting Asian security."
